Pursuant to due call and notice thereof, and there being a quorum present, the School Board meeting of Independent School District 271 was called to order by Chair Heather Starks at 7:00 p.m. on September 25, 2023, in the Arlene Bush Board Room at the Educational Services Center, 1350 W. 106th Street, Bloomington, Minnesota.

Chair Starks acknowledged that Bloomington Public Schools rests on the traditional, ancestral and contemporary land of the Dakota. The name of our state is Mni Sota Makoce, Land where the waters reflect the skies or clouds. Mni means water; Sota means clear, but not perfectly so, cloudy. Makoce means a place, land, or country. Recognizing the land is an expression of gratitude and appreciation to those whose territory we reside on and a way of honoring the Indigenous people.

STUDENT SCHOOL REPRESENTATIVES

A video prepared by our Community Relations Department was played, introducing the new School Board Student Representatives, Kenneth Adah, Kennedy High School, and Dhruvika Uppal, Jefferson High School.

OATH OF OFFICE

Kenneth Adah, Kennedy High School Junior, and Dhruvika Uppal, Jefferson High School Senior, were sworn in by David Holman, Legal Counsel, as Student Representatives to the School Board of Independent School District 271, Bloomington Public Schools for the school year 2023-24.

Both Kenneth and Dhruvika read prepared reports highlighting activities and events at their respective schools.

V. SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Superintendent Dr. Eric Melbye reported the dates and activities planned for Kennedy High School's Homecoming on Saturday, September 29th, and Jefferson High School's Homecoming on Friday October 6th. Dr. Melbye reported Bloomington Public Schools is the first ever Amazon boot-up site in Minnesota. We will not only be hosting scratch PD for our own Digital Learning Specialists, but also tech integrationists from area school districts, thus

cementing our place in history as Minnesota's leading K-12 computer science program. Dr. Melbye reminded the public that, as part of Minnesota's Free School Meals Program, starting in the 2023-24 school year all students can have one breakfast and one lunch free of charge each day at school. However, the Application for Educational Benefits is still important for students who may qualify for benefits such as reduced fees for transportation, athletic programs, academic or extracurricular activities, and to help school qualify for education funding, discounts and other meal programs that benefit all students. All families are encouraged to apply or opt out unless Bloomington Schools has notified them by letter or email that they qualify for educational benefits for this school year. Dr. Melbye acknowledged that there has been a fair amount of concern and confusion regarding new legislative language and how it impacts school resource officers, or in our case, school liaison officers to do their jobs. It has caused law enforcement agencies in a number of counties and municipalities to pull SRO/SLO services from schools. Fortunately, the Bloomington Schools and Bloomington Police Department have a history of strong collaboration and trust, and we have maintained our School Liaison Office program throughout the Fall, and he was happy to report that, with the further clarification the Attorney General Ellison published last week, we will continue to have Bloomington Police Department School Liaison Officers working with students and staff in our secondary buildings. Dr. Melbye also heard, anecdotally, that many other area agencies that pulled out of schools are returning.

Dr. Melbye asked for a motion to establish professional development sessions of the School Board on Monday, October 16, 2023, Monday, November 20, 2023, and Monday, December 4, 2023, at 5:00 pm with TeamWorks International in order to continue work on governance. So moved by Matt Dymoke, seconded by Dawn Steigauf. Motion carried unanimously. Dr. Melbye asked for a motion to establish a closed session of the School Board on October 9th, 2023, following the Study Session, pursuant to M.S. 13D.03 to discuss the District's labor negotiations strategy for District bargaining groups. So moved by Matt Dymnoke, seconded by Dawn Steigauf. Motion carried unanimously.

VIII. BOARD MEMBER REPORTS

Matt Dymoke shared that the Education Foundation of Bloomington had it's first meeting last week. Innovative Grants for classroom teachers will be opening soon. Up to \$1,000 will be available for innovative projects in their classrooms. The Policy Committee will keep working on

the many legislative changes. They meet in October. The Finance and Facilities Committee meets Friday with Rod Zivkovich and will continue work started last week in the Professional Development meeting. Also, this week is the first meeting of the Community Ed Advisory Committee. Mia Olson attended the Bloomington Parent and Family Advisory Council (formerly known as the PTSA). PTA members from all Bloomington Public elementary schools, middle schools and high schools are still included, but voting member organizations now also include the Early Learning Advisory Council and New Code Academy. The next meeting on October 4's topic is "Bloomington Forward" and will be offered hybrid, either in-person at ESC in Room 610, or online. A good way to get school updates from all the schools and programs. Beth Beebe attended the Valley View Elementary Fall Carnival. There was really good family turnout, with as many as 50 volunteers, including high schoolers. The BBQ food, help with set-up and take-down was provided by Hometown Church. Director Beebe also recently participated in an on-line seminar or "critical conversations". Nelly Korman shared that the next Legislative Committee Meeting is scheduled for November 8, in preparation for the next Legislative session. Dawn Steigauf recently attended the Special Ed Community Advisory Council meeting where they reviewed last year and set goals for this coming school year. She attended the "Falcon Connection", which was well attended by families. Each grade level made presentations, food trucks were available, as well as Tech help for families. Beth Beebe is personally submitting a resolution to the MSBA for the delegate assembly on the way our MCA test scores are calculated. Nelly Korman said there is also a resolution being written for the MSBA on behalf of the School Board and Bloomington School District which the Superintendent is helping to draft, relating to Special Education. Chair Starks, along with several other Board Members attended both Jefferson and Kennedy High School Hall of Fame ceremonies. She also attended the MSBA Advocacy Tour. She and Superintendent Melbye visited the Hennepin County Attorney's Office, regarding truancy. Governor Walz and Education Commissioner Willie Jett visited several Bloomington Schools on September 5th. Chair Starks thanked the Board Members for visiting and being active in their ambassador schools.
