Our Compass: Safe, sustainable learning environment



distancing and wearing a mask, practices that are required while in any of our schools and district buildings

Like other schools across Minnesota and the country, we've learned this about the COVID-19 global pandemic: expect change.

We've tackled the simple but weighty question, "How do we return to school amid a pandemic?" Although there are no right answers, we've established that our compass will always be fixed on creating a safe and sustainable learning environment amidst the uncertainties of these times. sustainable learning environment for students, teachers, staff and families.

It became clear in our work with district and school leaders and staff that the issues and challenges of creating a viable district-wide staffing plan for the hybrid learning model and flex option while balancing parent preferences with staff requests for accommodations for health concerns were too great to ensure a quality educational experience for every child.

How we landed on Distance Learning

There is no doubt that in-person learning and support is best for most students. Being together with classmates and caring adults is beneficial to students' academic and social-emotional health. As much as we all want certainty, there are no easy answers.

Earlier this summer, we worked diligently to gather parent and staff data needed to inform our return to school plans. We monitored three key data sources:

- Hennepin County's COVID-19 health rates and the expert advice of our partners at Bloomington Public Health;
- Parent preferences for the learning model that best fit their family situation, with a majority of parents wanting flexibility for their children to attend in-person, while others favored at-home learning; and
- Teacher exemptions. Nearly 200 teachers requested exemptions from on-site work because they or their family members are at risk of severe illness from COVID-19 as specifically addressed in the governor's executive order and federal law.

With this number of exemptions, we were unable to staff the hybrid and flex models. Balancing parent preferences with staff requests for exemptions based on health concerns, we were unable to ensure a quality educational experience for every child.

With our lens on the fall, teams of district and school leaders, teachers and support staff have prepared educational models and safety guidelines for each possible scenario we encounter in the 2020-2021 school year.

In this back-to-school issue, you'll find elements of our Distance Learning 2.0 + Supports plan to address student learning while keeping students and staff safe.

All of you—from the School Board to administration to teachers and support staff seek a return to safe in-person learning. And, while we had planned to open our doors on Tuesday, Sept. 8, we could not ensure a safe and We will begin the school year with a vastly improved Distance Learning 2.0 + Supports plan, which will provide opportunities for in-person learning to students who need more support, and the new Bloomington Online School.

In all we do this year, we will continue to put safety first and leverage science, data and public health evidence to inform our decision-making to serve every student and staff member. Our plans will continue to be flexible and may be adjusted as conditions allow.

We appreciate your continued support, understanding and patience.

Looking ahead, exploring ways to return to in-person learning begins with building empathy for stakeholder needs and concerns. Whether for preschool and elementary students initially, or every student, we can assure you our goal is to find a way for students and staff to return to school safely.



Distance Learning 2.0 + Supports: What to expect

hroughout the summer, BPS teachers, support staff, technology integrationists and curriculum and instruction experts have worked to create a robust Distance Learning 2.0 + Supports plan. Improvements were made based on feedback from staff, students and parents:

- Consistent schedule for students for synchronous learning
- Consistency in parent communication
- Streamlined technology tools and platforms
- Courses designed around online learning best practices
- Assessments and grading aligned to highest priority standards

SAMPLE ELEMENTARY STUDENT DAY

- Morning meeting: 20-30 minutes with direct teacher instruction
- Small group instruction: 20-30 minutes with direct teacher instruction in reading or math
- Self-directed learning: 3-4 blocks of recorded instruction with activities to complete for reading, math, social studies, science or health
- Self-directed learning: specialist instruction in music, physical education, or art
- ✓ Small group instruction: special education, intervention and English language support

SAMPLE MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDENT DAY

- Advisory: daily connection with teacher and advisory classmates
- Exploratories: Up to 40 minutes of synchronous instruction
- Core subjects: Up to 30 minutes of synchronous instruction
- Optional support: teachers available for student support during regular office hours
- Self-directed learning: students complete activities assigned during synchronous/ asynchronous instruction at their own pace
- Small group instruction: special education, intervention and English language support

SAMPLE HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT DAY

- First, third and fifth hours: 1-2 synchronous classes per week
- ✓ Second, fourth, and sixth hours: 1-2 synchronous classes per week
- Self directed learning: students complete activities assigned during synchronous/ asynchronous instruction at their own pace
- Optional support: teachers are available for support during posted times

Building Relationships

We know student-teacher and school-family relationships are a key to school success. We are committed to building relationships with students and families. All schools will have time in the first weeks of school to build relationships and distribute materials. All schools will have multiple days for technology drop off and pick up with support.

The four-day instruction schedule will help maintain consistency if we are able to move to a hybrid model in the future.

Daily schedules will vary by level and grade with consistent times for direct teacher instruction.

Preschool and Early Learning

Preschool, early childhood special education (ECSE) and early childhood family education (ECFE) programs will start the school year in the Distance Learning 2.0 + Supports model.

- Emphasis on community building, relationships and connectedness by incorporating social emotional supports in academic content
- Weekly asynchronous learning plan (independently at your own pace) with a balance of teacher-created lesson plans and activities, read-alouds and mini group-time videos
- Personal family check-ins and small group Google Meets throughout the month



During Distance Learning, grab and go meals will be available to all BPS families at no charge at any of the following sites.

Monday pickup includes breakfast and lunch for Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. Thursday pickup includes breakfast and lunch for Thursday and

Teachers and specialists will collaborate to differentiate instruction based on individual student needs and maintain consistency in services for English language learners and students who receive special education services.

Elementary

- Daily synchronous morning meeting required for attendance
- Approx. 1 hour of synchronous learning per day
- Up to 2 hours of asynchronous learning per day with activities to complete
- Synchronous meets with art, music and PE specialists on Wednesday with asynchronous/independent learning throughout the week
- Additional small group direct instruction added as needed for English language, interventions and special education

Secondary

- 1-3 hours of synchronous learning per day
- Up to 3 hours of asynchronous learning per day with activities to complete
- Students are required to attend all synchronous classes and sessions

Safe and Supportive Schools

The Bloomington Public Schools Safe and Supportive Schools plan is a comprehensive approach to making instructional spaces exciting for all students, where students' strengths are enriched, needs are supported and aspirations are nourished.

Centered around families, students and staff and created with an equity focus, the district's Safe and Supportive Schools design team identified three key areas for Bloomington's plan:

- Climate of Care
- Tailored Instruction
- Meaningful Engagement

The Safe and Supportive Schools plan ensures each and every student receives equitable access to resources and opportunities. With this focus in mind, the School Board and staff will participate in professional growth opportunities to examine values, beliefs and behaviors and how those impact our systems and work, revising policies and practices to create the most safe and supportive school district possible.

Childcare in Distance Learning

During Distance Learning, Early Learners Academy and Kids' SAFARI will be open for childcare, prioritizing enrollment for Tier 1 essential workers, at Poplar Bridge and Indian Mounds elementary schools.

Children will have daily creative learning experiences and enrichment activities. Staff, families and children are expected to follow Minnesota Department of Health guidelines around face coverings, social distancing and other health and safety precautions.
