Our students today and tomorrow will have a better opportunity for success so long as we join together in ensuring a strong school district and strong community.

## School Board favors renewal of capital projects levy

When our community comes together to embrace and support the mission of schools, it is a tribute to the families and residents that live here. That was the case in 2013 when voters approved the Safe & Innovative Schools capital projects levy to fund \$6 million a year for 10 years.

To date, funding targeted safety and security projects to prevent, prepare for, protect against and respond to potential school emergencies, and educational technology has prepared students to compete in a global economy.

With the levy set to expire in 2024, the School Board is seeking community support to renew the school safety and technology levy for another 10 years. The funding is a reinvestment in school safety and security, and Next Technologies for Learning.

If voters approve the levy renewal, homeowners would not see a tax impact unless the individual property value changes. The levy is based on a percentage of the net tax capacity - currently 5.858 percent - of all Bloomington properties.

A loss of this current revenue will result in significant budget reductions that would impact staffing, intervention and prevention programs, improved security measures and technology systems.

## Why reinvest in educational technology?

Bloomington Public Schools has a long history of innovative, future-focused thinking and planning. With the 2013 voter-approved referendum funding, we've emerged as a leader in school safety and technology for learning.

When the district proposed the Safe & Innovative Schools capital projects levy in 2013, few could have predicted the circumstances we were preparing for. When schools were required to close in March of 2020, the district already had the technology, systems and training in place to quickly implement remote learning plans. Students had Chromebook devices and were experienced using them as a learning tool. Teachers were familiar and practiced at creating digital lessons and activities. The referendum investment helped ease the transition to distance learning.

Our Next Technologies for Learning plan continues to meet the increasingly diverse needs and learning styles of today's students, and prepares our youngest students with transferable skills, creative thinking, and for jobs that have yet to be created.

Funds from the 2013 levy helped schools move to one-to-one learning (a device for each student), and prioritized closing the Digital Access Gap for students with limited or no internet at home. Teachers digitized coursework so learning platforms, online tools and digital content were ready when the district moved to remote learning. Families were more connected and could better support students because of the teacher's experiences with online learning platforms.


Every student learns differently, and students learn best when instruction is personalized to each student's diverse and unique needs. Bloomington Public Schools uses the power of technology to support every student.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a special election has been called and will be held in and for Independent School District No. 271 (Bloomington Public Schools), Minnesota, on November 8, 2022, between the hours of 7 a.m. and 8 p.m. to vote on the following question:

## School District Question Renewal of Expiring Capital Project Levy

The board of Independent School District No. 271 (Bloomington Public Schools), Minnesota has proposed to renew its capital project levy authorization expiring after taxes payable in 2023 in the maximum amount of 5.858% times the net tax capacity of the school district to provide funds for the acquisition, installation, support and maintenance of software and technology and the acquisition, installation, support and maintenance of safety and security improvements to school district facilities and equipment. The proposed tax rate is not being increased from the previous year's rate. The proposed renewal of the expiring capital project levy authorization will raise approximately \$9,810,844 for taxes first levied in 2023, payable in 2024, and will be authorized for ten (10) years. The estimated total cost of the projects to be funded over that time period is approximately \$98,108,440.
